"Our officers always keep a few teddy bears in their cruisers to give out to traumatized kids," said Police Chief Robert Morgan. "We thank the St. Vincent de Paul School for their support, and promise to give these teddy bears a good home." Mayor Matthew Starr thanked the city's Recreation Board for helping make Friday's teddy bear donation happen.
"Anything we can do to show the city's youngest residents that police officers aren't scary but are here to help them is vital," he said. "Their mission to protect and serve can mean so many things, including handing out a teddy bear to a child in need from time to time."

## National Origami Day

Origami comes from two Japanese words, "Ori" which means to fold, and "Kami" which means paper.Even though it is now called origami, it used to be called "Orikata" which means "folded shapes." Origami came from Japan in the 6th century and was used to decorate temples. Origami is used to symbolize good fortune, hope, and healing. There are three different types of origami, 1. Single Sheet Origami, 2. Modular Origami and 3. Composite Origami.

Single Sheet Origami is origami made from one sheet of paper, unlike modular and composite origami. Modular Origami is a type of origami that is made from identical pieces of paper put together by folding the pieces together. Composite Origami is when the origami piece is made from two or more pieces of paper that are all different. Origami
is typically animals but sometimes can be other things such as fortune tellers and paper stars. Each animal-based origami represents something different, like the paper cranes. Paper cranes represent honor, good fortune, loyalty, and longevity.

It was believed that if you made 1,000 paper cranes, you'd be granted a wish. Some of the most difficult pieces of origami are the three-headed dragons, phoenix and Ryu-zin. Ryu-zin is considered to be the most difficult origami piece in the world, a very intricate paper dragon that took an entire month to make. Some pisces on the easier side are swans, owls and lucky stars.
DId you know origami is more than just if you correctly folded the paper correctly or not? It actually depends on the paper's printing process.
